


Proposition and Assertions of Presentation

- Proposition: Elements of the U.S. Value System Create Barriers to Creating More Resilient Places
- Key Assertions:
 - Moving to a More Resilient Society Requires Transformational Processes
 - Adaptive Strategies Can Lead to Amplification of Social Disparities
 - Double-Looped Learning is a Requirement for Transformative Actions
 - National Values Influence the Ability of Society to Shift from Adaptive to Transformative Resilience
 - A National Value System for the U.S. can be Identified and Elements are Incompatible with the Transformative Actions Required for Resilience Building
 - Role of Elements of National Values Vary by Region and Sub-Populations
 - Regional Rather Than National Approaches to Resilience Should be the Focus of Public Policy

Social Amplification of Disaster Risk: Conceptual Model




Adaptive and Transformative Resilience: Double Loop Leaning and Value Modification
